## Making a Smooth Transition...

### How Parents Can Help

- Be enthusiastic about your school. If you are excited and positive about the new school year, your child will be too!
- Begin daily routines that will add continuity to your child's schedule; for example, your child can lay out clothes the night before and have all school materials ready for the next day.
- Establish a regular bedtime. Also, try to establish a daily routine that includes a time to read together.
- Put aside extra quality time for communicating with your child. Talk to your child about the things that your child learned in school each day.
- Let your child know that you believe learning is important and stress that it is the main purpose of school.
- Have a set routine for homework. Your child should know when he/she is expected to complete homework each day.
- Establish a place in your home where your child has a quiet atmosphere to complete homework and has needed supplies.
- Listen when your child talks to you, especially about school, teachers, and friends.
- Develop a system to give reinforcement at home for working hard in school.
- Reward the hard work and achievements of your child each and every day!
