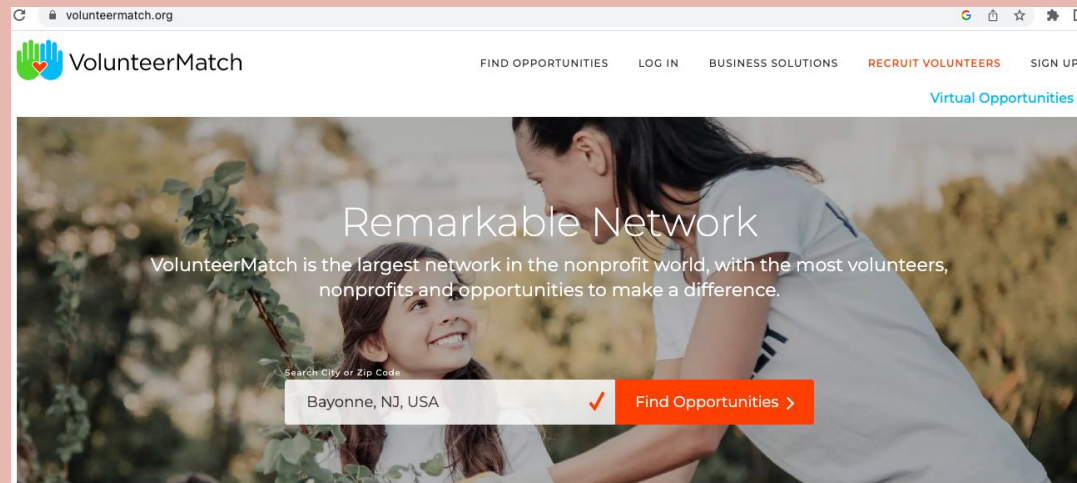

COURSE OFFERINGS

Teacher Recommendation for Course Placement

Students course placement is determined by your content area teacher not your counselor.

Teachers make their determination based on:

- Mid-Year Grade (marking period 1 and 2)
- District Assessment
- IXL Diagnostic Assessment
- CogAT

Teachers also consider your:

- Ability to handle to content area material
- Work ethic
- Completion of classwork/homework assignments
- Ability to meet deadlines for submission of assignments

Course Differentiation

- **Level B**
 - College Preparatory Program
- **Honors**
 - Summer assignments and projects expected
 - Rigor of program is more advanced
- **Level A**
 - Pacing is faster than Level B
- **Advanced Placement (AP)**
 - College level course
 - Summer assignments and projects required
 - Curriculum is approved by College Board
 - Most rigorous program
 - Required to take AP Exams

Level Change Requests

Students should speak with their teacher PRIOR to requesting a Level Change.

Students request a Level Change by submitting a letter from a parent/guardian requesting a level change; letters must be brought to school counselors by **April 19**;

Director reviews the student's request as well as academic history and teacher placement. Directors make decisions by **April 24**;

If student's request for a level change is not granted, student may complete an Appeal Level Change Request.

- Completed form must be brought to school counselor by **April 29**;
- Students will be allowed to waive into the course without the approval of the teacher or Director;
- However, since the student did not meet the criteria for the course level and because they were advised that their requested placement was not appropriate, the student must remain in the course regardless of academic performance.

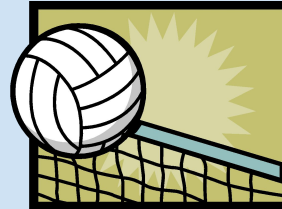

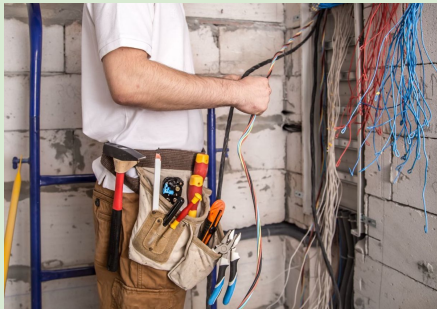
