Explain how the analysis of passages and understanding the</p>	<p>Sample Guitar 4 Lesson Plan for Marking Period 1</p> <p>Class: Guitar 4 - 40 minutes</p> <p>Suggested Activities:</p> <p><u>Ensemble repertoire rehearsal/critique</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <u>Tuning & Warm-up</u> (5 minutes) - scale/arpeggio exercises, alt i/m • <u>Repertoire rehearsal</u> (30 minutes) - Students will rehearse repertoire for winter recitals within the ensemble and individually as a soloist. Students will use critical listening skills and teacher assessment/critique in order to refine his/her performance. Students will pay particular attention to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Correct notes/rhythms • Correct L.H. / R.H. fingerings • Playing in correct positions • Articulation/phrasing • Dynamics • Form • Expressive playing • <u>Closure</u> (5 minutes) - Assess rehearsal accomplishments and areas that need refinement. Pack up instruments. <p><u>Solo repertoire research/rehearsal/critique (ongoing)</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Select one solo from each time period that will be learned this year - Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Contemporary (20th Century - present). • Select piece to learn for first marking period. 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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Offer resources to students in a variety of ways to accommodate for multiple learning styles. • Engage all learners through implementation of various resources including visual, audio, and tactile materials. • Provide easy access to course resources so the student can utilize materials within the classroom or at home to reiterate content learned within the course. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Utilize a multi-sensory (Visual, Auditory, Kinesthetic, Tactile) approach as needed during instruction to better engage all learners. • Provide alternate presentations of skills and steps required for project completion by varying the method (repetition, simple explanations, visual step-by-step guides, additional examples, modeling, etc). • Allow additional time to complete classwork as needed, when required according to students' IEP or 504 plan.
