COLLEGE ADMISSION

Definition of a Carnegie Unit / College Entrance Unit / Academic Unit

Carnegie Units are also referred to as College Entrance Units (CEU) or Academic Units. College and Universities use these terms interchangeably. These terms are normally used by colleges to express a quantitative evaluation of high school courses acceptable as preparation for college; one full-year course is equivalent as one unit. Acceptable units are determined by the college in question and are usually given for academic preparatory courses only: English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and World Languages. Sixteen units make up the usual college minimum requirements.

Suggested Programs of Study for College Planning

Colleges considered to be most competitive generally look for students to the most rigorous academic program their high school has to offer. It is recommended that students select from the wide array of offerings in order to show a perspective college that they have a well-rounded background for possible career and vocational interests.

Required Courses

A required course is one which all students at Bayonne High School must successfully complete to satisfy the State and local requirements for graduation.

Elective Courses

An elective course is any course other than that defined required course; electives are required and chosen to complete a student's program after the required subjects are selected. A student may select any course if he/she has meet the specific prerequisites. Electives enrich one's background, complete the entrance requirements for specific types of schools or colleges, and offer experiences in areas of special talent. Each year the choice of these courses is very important. Selection should be made only after careful consideration of the relationship of the course or course to one's needs, goals, capacities, and interests.

Competitiveness of Colleges

The type and competitiveness of your academic program and the quality of work you do during your four years in high school will serve as your resume for college acceptance. Your scholastic record, submitted to a college or university on your high school transcript, is considered the most important factor in determining your chances for admission.

In preparing for college admission, you should earn at least 16 Carnegie units by graduation. This means carrying a minimum of four academic courses (English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and World Language) each year in high school. The stronger student, or the one seeking to take the most challenging program possible, should consider five or more each year. Student should pursue those courses in which they have an interest in order to be successful.

After discussing your academic options with your parents each year, students are encouraged to consult with their school counselor to select courses that offer a challenging learning experience and are aligned to the students' post-graduation plans.
