- Construct a literary analysis essay of two texts that include some commonality.
- Develop original narratives based on point of view.
- Formulate original thesis comparing poems and supplementary texts to anchor text.
- Investigate informational topics through several articles or multimedia and make connections to the anchor text.

Weeks 9-10: Create

- Design a body biography or identity chart for the characters of the anchor text to highlight tragic flaws and formulate an understanding of personal ambition, fate, and free will.
- Construct a literary analysis essay related to the author's tone through multiple platforms or comparing two characters within text.
- Investigate two texts that include commonality in order to construct analysis on commonalities.
