PART ONE: Vocabulary

Becoming familiar with the vocabulary terms below will help you understand essential ideas in the English 12 curriculum. Your assignment is to create a **Google Slides presentation or Google Doc** that represents your understanding of **five** words from the vocabulary list below. For each word include the following information:

- One definition
- One original sentence correctly using the vocabulary word
- One example of how the word is occurring now or has happened in the past
- An image that represents the word

PART TWO: Narrative Task

Read the excerpt of the short story “Where Lovers Dream” by Anzia Yeziarska (<https://www.commonlit.org/en/texts/excerpt-from-where-lovers-dream>). In this short story, the narrator attends a wedding and runs into someone she used to know. Choose one of the two options below to fulfill part two of your summer assignment.

Option one: In the same style of Yeziarska, continue writing the end of the story. Keep in mind Yeziarska’s use of dialogue and figurative language to show the emotions of the narrator. Your response should be at least one page double-spaced.

Option two: Take note of how the narrator’s feelings evolve through the text. Create a poem that accurately depicts the way the narrator feels after running into someone from her past at the wedding. Your poem should be at least 16 lines and should reflect the same feelings that the narrator exhibits in the short story.
